Park Improvements New Parks

Norm Westbrook Park Phase I

On October 1, 2023, the Department celebrated the soft opening of Norm Westbrook Park Phase I, located at 6400 NW 100th Street, west of I-75.

The park features 1.5 miles of equestrian trail and 0.5 miles of hiking trails, parking lots and picnic areas. The land for the park was donated by Mr. Norm Westbrook, who upon his passing wanted the land to become a park. The Department received a generous donation from an anonymous donor to extend the equestrian trail to 3.0 miles and build equine obstacles along the trail.

Phase I of the park, totaling \$363,000 was funded through the Parks Fee Fund. Phase II will consist of a restroom, picnic pavilion and a new playground. Phase II is expected to move forward by Fall of 2025 and completed Fall 2026.

Ocala Park Estates

The Department celebrated the soft opening of Ocala Park Estates Park, located at 6371 NW 65th Street, west of I-75.

The approximate 1.5-acre park features a playground, parking lot, picnic pavilion and grass area for open play. The Department was donated the parcel by the developer for the intended use of a public park.

The \$194,500 cost of the park was funded through the Parks Fee Fund. The park is expected to open summer of 2024 upon the completion of a picnic pavilion.

Rotary Sportsplex - Turf Field

Bidding is due at the end of January 2024 on the synthetic turf fields for soccer fields 4 & 5 at Rotary Sportsplex. Project elements include the conversion of two existing soccer fields to synthetic turf fields, addition of paved parking, field lighting and enhanced spectator areas.

This sports field improvement is a Board of County Commissioners initiative that will serve the community by allowing a wider range of sports that can be played all year. Construction is projected to start by mid-2024. Funding for this project is through a combination of the General Fund and the Parks Fees Fund.

Heagy-Burry Boat Ramp


Heagy-Burry Boat Ramp, located in north Marion County, is a popular boating and fishing destination that provides one of only two public access points to Orange Lake. This is an important boat ramp to the local community as it is also the only access point to the lake in Marion County. These improvements are one of the Department's "legacy" projects and we couldn't be happier to get this one underway. Funding for this project was made possible by the combination of a \$969,000 Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission service grant, the Pennies for Parks Fund and the General Fund. This project includes the construction of a two-lane boat ramp, floating dock system and parking lot. Bidding is set to commence in January 2024 with construction projected to start by mid-2024 and completion in 2025.

Reddick Park

Marion County, together with the Town of Reddick, will begin the design of the Town's first public park in January of 2024. The park will be located at a former Marion County Sheriff substation site that has existing infrastructure in place, such as an asphalt parking lot and driveway, site lighting, large beautiful trees and utilities. Funding for this park was made possible by the Town of Reddick and the General Fund. This project will include the construction of a playground, restroom, parking lot restriping, sidewalk and a grass area for open play. Most importantly, this park will create a space for the community to enjoy outdoor recreation, gather for events and connect with nature. The park is scheduled to open in the fall of 2024.



Southeastern Livestock Pavilion Improvements



Wash Rack Project

In January 2023 the construction of the new wash rack was completed. The previous wash rack had been a longstanding problem. High usage in the area flooded not only the wash area, but the adjoining road, gate, and parking lot. The upgrades include replacing the rotted wood rails with stainless steel rails and installing a new drainage system. Clients are extremely satisfied with the improvements. This project was funded through the General Fund.

Extension Auditorium A/V Improvements

The SELP Auditorium is used primarily for classes, graduations, meetings, weddings and banquets. The A/V system in the auditorium was outdated and insufficient for the level of service necessary to host these types of events. The Parks & Recreation Department, Facilities Management Department and the Information Technology Department, with the help of a professional acoustics consultant, created a plan to completely overhaul the system. The improvements included a new upgraded sound system with 15 microphones; replacing the old projectors and screen with two new high-resolution screens; and. the addition of three new screens in the north hall. The new system in the north hall operates separately when the air wall is closed and syncs up with the main A/V system when it is open. Feedback from new and repeat customers alike in regards to the new A/V system have been overwhelmingly positive due to the quality of both sound and pictures. Customers who utilize our north hall also appreciate the viewing options provided by the additional screens.

Southeastern Livestock Pavilion Improvements



SELP Campground

Construction of the SELP Campground began in March of 2023 thanks to a one million dollar grant from the Florida Department of Agriculture. The campgrounds will be located on the north east corner of the SELP property next to the back arena and is a part of Phase III of the Master Plan. This project includes 66 campsites that will each have water, sewer, electric and WiFi. Each electrical box will include 30-amp, 50 amp and 110-amp outlets. A new dump station will be added near the entrance closest to the SELP auditorium and a new gated entrance will also be added off of Jacksonville Rd. The additional campsites will allow the facility to book larger events that could previously not be accommodated due to the limited number of campsites. This project is scheduled to be completed in April of 2024.

Project Design

Sales Arena Remodel

The remodel of the Sales Arena is part of the Marion County Administrative Strategic Plan with the goal of improving the overall customer experience and creating new event opportunities that cannot currently be accommodated. Improvements will include larger and ADA compliant restrooms, new paint, removal of drop tiles from the ceiling, improved climate control, improved acoustics and seating.

Dave Baillie Jr. Announcer Tower

Construction of a new concrete block, 550 square foot announcer's tower in the Dave Baillie Jr. Arena began in late 2023 and is expected to be completed in April, 2024. The new announcer's tower will be located in the arena directly in front of the stairs to the old tower. This project will provide a tower that is more accessible to the arena that is secure and properly climate controlled for the A/V equipment. This project is also part of the overall initiative to improve the customer experience, as outlined in the Marion County Administrative Strategic Plan.

Dave Baillie Jr. Arena Sound Upgrade

The sound system in the Dave Baillie Jr. arena is schedule to be replaced in late 2024 as part of the overall initiative to improve the customer experience at SELP, as outlined in the Marion County Administrative Strategic Plan. This new sound system will provide much needed A/V improvements to the arena, barn, sales arena and surrounding facilities.





Project Design

Airport Taxiway and Vault & Beacon Project

The Airport Taxiway and Vault & Beacon project is part of the Airport Master Plan and includes both state and federal grant match funding. Phase 1 (FY24) will consist of the design of a full-length parallel taxiway (5,000'x35) to the primary runway 5-23. The new power vault will supply the necessary power to the parallel taxiway which significantly increases safety for pilots by mitigating mid-air collisions. The project will include holding bays for aircraft run-up, LED taxiway lights, LED position and directional signs and a new L-828 regulator. Construction is planned for FY25.

Airport T-Hangar Project

The multi-phase project will consist of the construction of 20 T-Hangar rental units. The completion of this project will increase the airport's economic impact for Marion County. Additionally, increasing the number of T-Hangars will meet the demand for quality multi-purpose, specialized facilities for both local and traveling customers. The design, engineering and permitting are planned to take place in FY25 while the construction is planned to take place in FY26.

Airport Fuel Farm Project

In accordance with the Empowering Marion County Strategic Plan, the Airport is adding infrastructure to support the demand for the forecasted aviation growth in the County's transportation system,

The Marion County Airport fuel farm is over 20 years old; the expectant life cycle of a fuel system is 10-15 years. Aside from the foundational fuel components the absence of modern technology and customer interface makes it very difficult to remain competitive with neighboring airports. Repair costs associated with the maintenance of this system have greatly impacted the fuels profit margin. The Marion County Airport relies heavily on fuel sales for revenue; aviation fuel sales represent the second largest revenue stream for the Airport.





Empowering Marion For Success II

Marion County adopted "Empowering Marion For Success II" Strategic Plan in 2022, this document reflects the County's initiatives for the next 5 years; such as organizational experience, resources and public facilities, planning and future growth, public infrastructure and public safety, Below are different ways the Department has met multiple goals over the year.

Organizational Experience

- Employee workload has been evaluated and all changes have been added to the Department's Operational Plans.
- Staff development has been the focus as multiple training plans have been addressed and future succession planning has been addresses in the Operational Plans.
- · Each area has worked with staff to improve work experience and address workload.
- Addressing Department staffing needs; Airport fully staffed, SELP fully staffed, Recreation fully staffed, 3 vacancies in Parks.

Resources and Facilities

- The Department has identified and prioritized new/expanded facility needs these have been incorporated into the Department Operational Plans.
- The Department is identifying diverse funding sources based on current service gaps and future needs of a growing population in Marion County.

Planning and Future Growth

- The department is currently looking for available land to expand upon current park service levels and increase sports tourism in Marion County.
- An update to the current Parks & Recreation Master Plan is due.
- Marion County Airport will continue to prioritize new and expanded improvements to address the growth of the facility through partnerships with the FDOT and FAA.
- The Southeastern Livestock Pavilion will prioritize updating the current Master Plan to align with the future success of the the event venue and meeting the needs of their event holders.

Parks & Recreation Operational Plans

In February the Parks & Recreation Department presented three separate operational plans for Parks & Recreation, Southeastern Livestock Pavilion and the Marion County Airport. Each operational plan clearly addresses work load, future staffing needs, capital improvement projects, funding strategies, facility improvements, equipment needs and community opportunities that current and future residents will be needing from the Parks & Recreation Department.

Parks & Recreation Operational Plan Highlights

- Capital replacement and renovation of multiple existing parks within the current park system
- Expansion and addition of future parks that serve an ever growing and diverse community.
- Destenation/Tourism parks and venues that serve the community and drive sports tourism to Marion County.
- Potential funding sources for consistent capital improvements projects for the Department.
- Expansion of the current staffing for workload and future expansion projects.

Southeastern Livestock Pavilion Operational Plan Highlights

- Capital replacement plan for current facilities that will improve current amenities and enhance customer experience.
- Investment in improvement projects that will add revenue streams and increase capacity of the venue.
- Improve current facility signage with a dynamic branding strategy that represents Marion County.
- Expansion of the current staffing do to workload and future venue/event expansion.

Marion County Airport Operational Plan Highlights

- Expansion and investment of facilities that will meet the ever growing need for hangar space within the airfield.
- Investment in infrastructure projects that will increase capacity and improve safety at the airport.
- Expand current reoccurring revenue streams to successfully fund capital improvement projects.
