## What makes this different?




- This is a comprehensive community-wide effort to eradicate litter within the County.

## Litter costs





 Tax Payers pay \$87 a year total to use Solid Waste facilities.

 Only \$6.61 (7.6% of the total fee) goes towards litter control.

## Litter amounts



- County employees, inmates and volunteers spend nearly 4,000 hours annually picking up litter.
- This results in over 120,000 pounds of litter collected monthly.
- 1.4 Million pounds annually.


